Parenting a child with special needs is challenging for anyone—let alone for newcomer parents who are juggling the demands of settling in to a new country, learning a new language, attending classes and managing life at home.

Newcomer parents of children with special needs sometimes feel alone, unsure of who they can trust. They may also be unaware of the supports, services, information and tools that are available (in most communities), which can not only benefit the child and parent, but also strengthen the capacity of your Care for Newcomer Children (CNC) program.

## WHAT IS EARLY IDENTIFICATION AND SUPPORT?

Early identification is about understanding typical child development and recognizing difficulties quickly so that newcomer children and families can be connected to services as soon as possible. In this way, they can get the support they need before issues become more ingrained, long-term problems.

## WHY IS EARLY IDENTIFICATION AND SUPPORT SO IMPORTANT?

The first three years of life are a critical period for healthy child development. This early period of life has a significant effect on the wiring and sculpting of the brain. Research shows that experience-based brain development in the early years of life has long-term effects on health, learning and behaviour.

Early identification and support promotes better outcomes. Generally, the earlier a child is connected to services and support, the bigger the impact. It is also important to recognize that:

- Preschool services are limited and waitlists can be long.
- Services beyond preschool years are often reduced.
- Some services require a formal diagnosis or identification for children to access services and support.
