The Facility

2-10 Diapering

- a. When a facility has diapering,
 - 1. A sink with hot and cold running water designated for toileting is located in the CNC space close to the diaper changing area, or written procedures for diapering developed in consultation with the local public health office are being followed.

Child Nutrition, Health and Safety

4-2 Food Safety and Food Service

General Procedures for Food Safety and Food Service

a. The CNC program follows written procedures for food safety and food service developed with advice from the local public health office.

4-4 Illness

a. The CNC program follows written illness procedures developed with advice from health professionals.

4-5 Administering Medication

- The CNC program develops and follows written procedures for handling and administering medication, developed with advice from health professionals, including procedures to ensure that
 - 1. Except in a life-threatening circumstance, a parent administers all prescription or non-prescription medication.
 - 2. All medication remains with a parent except
 - C. Medication provided by a parent for administration by CNC staff in a life-threatening circumstance.
 - D. Medication that must be refrigerated that is provided by a parent for administration by the parent.
 - E. Medication that remains with the child that is prescribed by a medical practitioner for a life-threatening condition.

4-6 Immunization

 When providing a long term CNC to a child, the ISO follows written procedures developed with advice from the local public health office for documenting the child's immunization information.

4-7 Accidents and Medical Emergencies Procedures

a. The CNC program develops and follows written procedures developed with advice from health professionals, for responding to accidents and medical emergencies, such as asthma attacks, seizures, anaphylaxis or other life-threatening allergic reactions, experienced by children while they are participating in the

4-3 Hygiene

General Procedures for Hygiene

- a. The CNC program follows written hygiene procedures developed with advice from health professionals, in relation to:
 - 1. Cleaning, sanitizing or disinfecting, the following as applicable,
 - A. Play materials and equipment;
 - B. Washrooms, and diapering and toileting equipment; and
 - C. Any other items with which children come into contact;
 - 2. Hand washing; and
 - Routine practices and any additional precautions to be taken in the event of contamination with bodily fluids.

Section 5:

Staffing and Supervision

5-1 General Staff Requirements Health

- c. For each staff member or volunteer who works directly with the children, the ISO has on file:
- 1. A record of a health assessment that
 - B. Includes evidence that the person has complied with the province's/ territory's immunization and tuberculosis control programs
- 2. Evidence that the staff member or volunteer continues to comply with the province's/territory's immunization and tuberculosis control programs as required by the local public health office.
